

Summer quiz - Answers

Key people in the Old Testament, and some questions to help you find out more about them:

Bible references are “Book, then Chapter, then Verses”. If no Bible at home use:

www.biblegateway.com

In the second box next to the “search” box you can select the Bible translation – there are two Catholic Bibles in the list – you will see them as you scroll down – but can I suggest you try “Easy-to-read-version” as you may find that is an easier translation.

Adam

1. How did God make him? Genesis 2:7 and Genesis 3:19 **From the dust of the ground**
2. How did God make Adam’s wife and what was her name? Genesis 2:21-25 and Genesis 3:20 **From Adam’s rib. Called her Eve – which means taken from man.**
3. What were the names of his first 2 sons, and what happened to them? Genesis 4:1-16 **Cain & Abel. Cain murdered Abel**

Noah

- 1 What were the names of his 3 sons? Genesis 5:**32** & Genesis 6:10 **typo – v32 Shem, Ham & Japheth**
- 2 What sort of wood did God tell Noah to make the ark from? Genesis 6:14-22 **Cypress (gopher) wood**
- 3 Noah sent 2 birds out from the ark to test if the flood waters had gone down. What were the 2 types of bird? Genesis 8:6-12 **Raven, then a dove**

Abraham

- 1 God promised him something special if he was prepared to trust him. How old was Abraham when he left his home country? Genesis 12:1-5 **75yrs old**
- 2 Abraham was called Abram but God changed his name. Why (clue – all names have a meaning so “Jesus” means “God saves”)? Genesis 17:5-8 **father of many nations (Abram means exalted father)**
- 3 God promised Abraham that his wife Sarah would have a son in her old age. How did Abraham respond to that news? Genesis 17:15-17 and how old was Abraham when he and Sarah had their only child? Genesis 21:1-7 **He laughed. He was 100 yrs old**

Isaac

- 1 What did God ask Abraham to do with his son, Isaac when he was a bit older? Genesis 22:1-18 (this passage points to what would happen later – see John 3:14-16) **Sacrifice him. It was a test to see if he idolised his son (i.e. worshipped him more than he worshiped God) & did he trust God as the promise God made was that it would be through his only son Isaac, whom he loved, that all his descendants would come, so Abraham thought – well God, if he dies you are going to have to bring him back from the dead. [ADDITIONAL QUESTION - **Who else allowed his only son to be sacrificed then brought him back to life?** Answer – God the Father and Jesus, God the Son]**

2 Abraham sent his servant to his home country to get a wife for his son Isaac. Where did the servant meet her and what was her name? Genesis 24:10-27 and verses 66-67. **At the well outside the town of Nahor; Rebekah**

3 Isaac has twin boys – who was born first, and so was “older”? And who was the other boy, the younger by a few minutes, through whom God’s plan would work out? Genesis 25:20-26 **Esau (which means hairy – he was also called Edom which means red) and Jacob (that means grasper as he was grasping his brother’s heel)**

Jacob

1 Jacob had a special dream from God. What did he see? Genesis 28:10-22 **A stairway to heaven with angels of God ascending and descending on it**

2 Rachael, the wife Jacob loved the most (he was allowed more than one wife) was not able to have children but when she did finally become pregnant she had a son. What did she call him? Genesis 30:20-24 **Joseph**

3 God changed Jacob’s name. What was his new name? Genesis 35:9-15 **Israel (which means struggles with God)**

Joseph

1 Joseph is famous for his coat of many colours (richly ornamented) and his dreams. What happened in his first 2 dreams when he was 17 years old? Genesis 37:2-11 **Out collecting corn when Joseph’s sheaf stood upright and his brothers sheaves gathered round his and bowed down to it. 2nd dream – the sun, moon and 11 stars bowed down to him.**

2 Joseph’s brothers sold him as a slave and he ended up in Egypt. God gave him the ability to interpret dreams. When he was in prison he interpreted 2 dreams (Genesis 40:1-23) but it was Pharaoh’s dreams that were the most important. What were those dreams about and what did they mean? Genesis 41:1-32 **Cupbearer vine, restored; baker bread, executed. Pharaoh 7 fat cows the seven skinny cows then another dream of 7 ears of corn healthy & good followed by 7 thin & scorched by the east wind, and those ears ate up the other 7 ears. 7 years of excellent harvests (“feast”) and then 7 years of famine (severe)**

3 How important did Joseph become in Egypt? Genesis 41:33-43 **In charge of the palace and only Pharaoh was greater than Joseph and then in charge of whole land of Egypt – 2nd in command to Pharaoh.**

Moses

1 How did baby Moses end up in Pharaoh’s household? Exodus 1:22 to 2:10 **hidden in basket in the reeds in river Nile as all male babies were to be killed at birth. Pharaoh’s daughter saw basket in river when bathing there and adopted him. Moses means draw out (as he was drawn out from the water)**

2 How did Moses meet God? Exodus 3:1-10 **saw a burning bush which did not burn up so went to investigate.**

3 Through Moses, God sends 10 plagues on the Egyptians. After the last plague Pharaoh lets the Israelites go, but then changes his mind and chases after them. What happens at the Red (“Reed”) Sea to the Israelites and to Pharaoh? Exodus 14:21-28 **Israelites went through with walls of water on each side as GOD parted the sea, which then swamped Pharaoh and his army.**

Joshua

1 What was Joshua’s name before it was changed (to Joshua)? Numbers 13:16 **Hoshea (son of Nun)**

2 Moses disobeyed God and so was not allowed to enter the Promised Land, so Joshua became the person to lead the people into the land God had promised them. What was the river they crossed to enter the land? Joshua 1:7-11 and Joshua 3:5-6 and 14-17 and Joshua 4:15-18 **River Jordan**

3 What happened to the town of Jericho that allowed the Israelites to capture it easily? Joshua 5:13 through to chapter 6: verse 20 **God commanded Joshua with the Israelite army to march with around the city once each day for 6 days carrying the ark of the covenant. On the 7th day to march around it 7 times with the priests blowing trumpets. And then they were to give one loud blast on the trumpets and the people shouted a war cry, and the walls fell down.**

Ruth

1 What was the name of Ruth’s first husband, who died, when she lived in Moab? Ruth 1:1-5 **Kilion**

2 What was the name of her second husband whom she married in the land of Judah? Ruth 4:9-13 **Boaz**

3 Who was Ruth’s great grandson? Ruth 4:14-22 (and look at Matthew 1:6-16 for another even more important descendent of Ruth) **King David, son of Jesse, son of Obed, son of Boaz & Ruth**

David

1 How many older brothers did David, the son of Jesse, have? 1 Samuel 16:1-13 **seven**

2 Who really defeated Goliath? 1 Samuel 17:45-51 **God – David makes that very clear in verses 45-47**

3 What evil thing did David do when he stayed at home in Jerusalem instead of leading his army in battle? 2 Samuel 11:1-27 **committed adultery with Bathsheba, then when she got pregnant David arranged for her husband (Uriah the Hittite) to be killed**

New Testament characters

These are 8 people from the New Testament in alphabetical order:

Barnabas

James

John
Luke
Mark
Matthew
Saul (Paul)
Timothy

1. Six of these have a book or a letter in their name after them in the New Testament – who are they?
2. Can you put those 6 in the order of that their books/letters come up in the Bible?
3. What do you know about any of them?
4. What order do these 8 people appear **by name (in other words, when is their name first mentioned)** in the narrative (story) in the New Testament?

ANSWERS: Questions 1&2 Matthew, Mark, Luke, John (the 4 gospel writers) – Matthew & John were 2 of the 12 apostles (disciples) of Jesus. After them comes Timothy – he was a leader of churches and Paul wrote 2 letters to him. James – is NOT James the apostle, the brother of John, nor was he the “other James” (often called “James the Lesser”) who was also one of the 12 – but he is actually “the brother of Jesus”. James wrote a letter to all churches. These are the 6 with a book or a letter in their name. Saul (Paul) wrote many letters (books) of the New Testament but none are named after him. Barnabas is one of the other disciples not one of the 12 who walked with Jesus.

3 You’ll can read up about them in your Bible using the verses below but I have added some information.

4 These verses show the order – done in the order of the rhyme about the first 12 books of the New Testament. Only when you have done all 8 will you know the “correct order” they appear in The Bible narrative – as a “James” is mentioned in Matthew 4:21 but it is not the James who wrote the letter which bears his name. These are the verses that show the order something about each of them. If you use the “search” option on www.biblegateway.com and type in the person’s name and use the “Topical index” tab, there are various verses about the person and click on their name for verses about their life e.g. <https://www.biblegateway.com/topical/Mark/Nave/> but for Paul you will get a lot more references, <https://www.biblegateway.com/topical/Paul/Nave/> and for James it only brings up James the Apostle, the brother of John.

1. Matthew 4:21 - **John ONLY**. He and his brother James were sons of Zebedee, and were fisherman. They were partners in the fishing business with Simon Peter and his brother Andrew. These were the first 4 that Jesus called to follow him as disciples. He wrote “The gospel according to John”. He also wrote 3 letters to all churches and the book of “The Apocalypse” (also called “Revelation”).
2. Matthew 9:9 - **Matthew** – also called Levi. He was a tax collector so gave up everything to follow Jesus as he could never go back to that job after walking out (the fishermen could always return to fishing).
3. Acts 4:36 - **Barnabas**. It says what his real name was (Joseph, a Levite from Cyprus) but his nickname was Barnabas – which means son of encouragement.
4. Acts 8:1 (extra verse – Acts 13:9) - **Saul** – the extra verse is when his name was changed to Paul
5. Acts 12:12 (extra verse Acts 12:25). Also read Mark 14:51-52 – and ask yourself why is small detail included when it is not mentioned in any of the other 3 gospel accounts about the arrest

of Jesus? - **Mark** – also called John Mark. He wrote “The gospel according to Mark”. The extra verse shows he travelled with Paul & Barnabas sharing the good news that Jesus died and rose again to set people free from sin, and open the gates of heaven so they could spend eternity with God when they died; and that meanwhile God would live in the hearts of his followers through God the Holy Spirit at work in all true believers. The other verse is interesting, as there is no reason why this would be added – unless HE was the person who ran away naked.

6. Acts 12:17 (extra verse Acts 15:13) – you will have to work out why he is not the person mentioned in Matthew 4:21 - **James**. This is not James the brother of John but James the brother of Jesus – who was leader of the church in Jerusalem. In the extra verse he sums up the outcome of the meeting as he is the leader of the church in Jerusalem.
7. Acts 16:1 - **Timothy**. He travelled with Paul, and went on to become a leader of the church when he was still young, so Paul wrote to encourage him
8. Colossians 4:14 – but also Luke 1:3 and Acts 1:1. For interest read Acts 16:8 and see if you can spot what happens between that verse and Acts 16:10 – read it carefully for a 2 letter word! - **Luke**. This is actually his first mention BY NAME – and he is called a Physician or Doctor. He wrote “The gospel according to Luke” and “Acts of the Apostles” – and the extra verses have him saying “I wrote this...” but HE does not say who he is. The other extra verses from Acts 16 – verse 8 in “they” but suddenly verse 10 is “we” – so Luke had joined them for part of the missionary journeys.

Ten questions on God

Please answer “true” (yes) or “false” (no) to each question and then we’ll talk about the answers. Questions 1 and 10 are TRUE. The others (questions 2 to 9) are all FALSE.

1. We worship one God - True
2. If The Father and Jesus and The Holy Spirit are all called “God” then we must worship three gods. – False. Right at the start of the Bible, in Genesis chapter 1 verse 26, God says “let US make....” The Trinity is one God but three persons. An example – Shamrock leaf; the sun (in the sky, light & heat); water (ice, water & steam); an egg (shell, white & yolk) – but they are all things. However God is a person so you can know Him. The Father, The Son and The Holy Spirit are 3 persons who have loved each other and been in relationship with each other for all eternity so examples like those given above help you understand 3 in 1 but it is not the same as knowing someone.
3. God is not interested in what is going on down here on earth because He lives in heaven – False. The Bible tells us that God is involved in every moment of every day of everyone’s life. He created the Universe and keeps it going.
4. I have been baptised and I go to church so God is not bothered about how I live my life. I can think and say and do whatever I want and still get to heaven – False. See 10

5. The Son of God did not exist until Mary became pregnant and gave birth to a baby that the angel Gabriel said she should call “Jesus” – False. The Son of God, the Messiah, is inferred in Genesis chapter 3 and in many parts of the Old Testament but was only called the name “Jesus” when He became human – God in human form.
6. The Holy Spirit is a force or energy, not a person – so we can call the Holy Spirit “it” (not “him”). – False. The Holy Spirit is a person, so if you hear someone call Him “it” please gently remind them that you are a person not an “it” and so is God the Holy Spirit.
7. The Holy Spirit only started His work at Pentecost – False. He was hovering above the waters in Genesis chapter 1 verse 2 - at the creation of everything
8. St Anthony's Church is the building I am sitting in now – False. The church is the people, so if the building falls down St Anthony's Church can meet somewhere else
9. I am a Christian because I go to church regularly and say my prayers – False. See 10
10. A Christian is someone who admits they have sinned (messed up), asks God to forgive them, and asks God to help them live the way God wants them to live. When someone asks this of God, then God the Holy Spirit comes to live in them. He helps them every moment of every day to think and say and do what God wants them to, and so to change slowly into the person God wants them to be. - True

10 things God cannot do

There are 10 things from this list that you God cannot do. Can you work out which ones they are? Put NO next to the appropriate number if you think God cannot do this
Put YES next to the appropriate number if you think God can do this.
The answers will appear on the church website with some Bible references for you to look up

The “odd numbers” are all things God can do.

The “even numbers” are all things God cannot do.

There are many options for Bible verses to explain the answers, these are a few.

Remember with the Psalms some Catholic Bibles (like the Jerusalem Bible) use the Hebrew numbering system, so using Biblegateway.com is better. There are two Catholic Bible translations in their list – and the best to use is New Revised Standard Version Catholic Edition.

The easiest translation would still be the “Easy-to-read-version”.

Remember “John” means “The gospel according to John” and “1 John” means the “first letter of John” (he wrote 3 letters as well as one gospel account). The letters of John are some of the last books in the Bible).

1. Get angry – God is right to get angry with us because we mess up His world, mess up ourselves and mess up other people – all with our selfishness. And then we deliberately ignore Him or blame Him for things that are really our fault. Deuteronomy 32:2, 1 Kings 11:9, Nahum 1:2 but remember God is slow to get angry and quick to forgive those who turn back

- to Him (“repent”) and full of mercy and grace – Exodus 34:6, Number 14:8, Nehemiah 9:17, Psalm 86:15, Psalm 103:8, Psalm 145:8). See also answers to points 7, 9, 16, 17 below.
2. Get older – God does not change – Psalm 102:26-27, Malachi 3:6, Hebrews 13:8
 3. Be jealous – God says He is a jealous God as He made us as His treasured possession to be with Him for ever and He does not want us to give our love to other things instead of to Him.
 4. Be tempted by evil – God is good all the time (Psalm 100:5). He cannot be tempted by evil – James 1:13, 1 John 1:5; also see point 8 below
 5. Be everywhere at the same time – the posh word is “omnipresent” – God is everywhere in the universe, all the time – Psalm 139:7-12
 6. Be surprised – the posh word here is “omniscient” – God knows everything – the past, the present and the future. He knows what decisions we will make, as well as what might have happened if we had made a different decision, which is mind-blowing! So nothing can surprise Him. Psalm 139:16-18
 7. Forgive all your sins (especially “mortal sins”) – 1 John 1:9 is the clearest verse but also look at Deuteronomy 4:31, Nehemiah 9:31, Psalm 103:12, Daniel 9:9, Micah 7:18. And see point 1 above.
 8. Tempt you to sin – James 1:13 and 1 John 1:5. However 1 Corinthians 10:13 reminds us that He does allow us to be led by Satan, or our own desires, into tempting situations but if we ask Him for help He will help us resist the temptation. Such trials and temptations help deepen our faith and strengthen our trust in God
 9. Accept you as you are – all messed up – God loves us as we are – John 3:16 – and when we turn to Him to repent (say we are truly sorry for messing things up and hurting/offending Him, then He forgives us). He then adopts us into His family and works with us, through God the Holy Spirit working inside us, to change us to be more like our older brother Jesus.
 10. Learn something new – see point 6 above. If God already knows everything He cannot learn anything new. Look at 1 Samuel 2:3 and Psalm 74:9
 11. Control all evil – the posh word is God is “omnipotent” (all powerful, almighty). He is in charge of Satan and his evil spirits and at the end of time they will be thrown into Hell for eternity. For now they can cause problems in God’s world and in our lives but the best way to illustrate this is to think of you walking along a path with a friend and a fierce dog rushes at you. However your friend is not in the slightest worried and the dog stops a few feet away from the path because it is on a very strong chain so cannot get to you on the path. Satan is limited to what God allows him to do – Job 1:12, Job 2:6 and all because God has a deeper purpose and plan which we do not know, and have to trust Him about it (remember God is also “omniscient” – He knows everything). If we are called by Him to follow Him (be Christians) then we are called to love Him, knowing God will work for good in all the difficult things in our lives but we may not find out why it happened that way until we get to see God in heaven - Romans 8:28. Only God knows the whole picture – we only get to see part of it, and only from where we are.
 12. Be lonely (so He made human beings because He was lonely and needed someone to love) – God is Trinity so is in a perfect loving relationship within Himself – God the Father loves God the Son & God the Holy Spirit, God the Son loves the God the Father and God the Holy Spirit, and God the Holy Spirit loves God the Father and God the Son. He chose to create the universe and us but He did not need to – see point 15 below
 13. Always tell the truth – God cannot lie. Jesus said “I am the way, the truth, and the life – John 14:6
 14. Allow everyone into heaven (even if they hate Him or refuse to believe He exists) – John 14:6 goes on to say “no-one can come to The Father except through me”. The only way to heaven is to believe and trust that Jesus has died for your sins, and to follow Him as your Lord (that means He is the boss of your life, not you) and then He is your Saviour and will bring you to be with Him in heaven when you die. The Bible calls it “falling asleep” not “dying” because,

as Christians, we expect to wake up again when Jesus returns at the end of time. See also Matthew 11:27, 2 Timothy 2:19, 1 John 2:1-6

15. Love Himself – The Trinity is a perfect relationship of love – see point 12 above
16. Love you more when you do good things – God IS love – He loves us 100%, always, all the time (John 3:16, 1 John 4:8, 1 John 4:16) – there is nothing we can do to make God love us more than He does already. We do good things because we love Him, not to try to earn His love. See point 17 below. God’s love lasts forever Ps 100:5.
17. Still love you when you sin – God still loves us when we sin, but He does not love our behaviour (sin). 1 John 6:6-10 reminds us what we need to do and Psalm 103:11-13 is the result when we do. Also see Ephesians 1:7-8 and Ephesians 2:4-5. Remember God looks at our heart (our inner self) not at what other people see - 1 Samuel 16:7, Isaiah 11:3-4 and John 2:29 – so He knows what we are really like – and He still loves us.
18. Make a mistake – that posh word again “omniscient” – God knows everything so He cannot make a “mistake”. Acts 15:18 and Romans 8:27. See point 11 above
19. Be responsible for everything that happens – both the good and the bad things – see point 11 above – Job 42:2, Isaiah 44:24, John 1:3 and John 13:3.
20. Break His promises – God is faithful, even when we are not faithful to Him – 2 Timothy 2:13. See also Deuteronomy 7:9, Deuteronomy 32:4, Psalm 100:5, Ephesians 1:5, Ephesians 1:11, Romans 8:29-30.

What do you need to do to get to heaven?

The readings at the end of the Church’s Liturgical Year are about Jesus returning at the end of time. “No-one knows when the end of time will happen”. We all assume we will live to old age but Jesus is clear, we need to be ready whether we die before He returns or if He returns today. Are you prepared for the day you see God face to face?

So “What do you need to do to be sure you get to heaven?” They had a family service about this topic at St John’s a number of years ago and the minister asked “What do you need to get into heaven”. Up goes a hand and a voice shouted out “Be dead”. The lad was correct but there is much more required than this. Thinking about heaven is not easy as we enjoy being in this world – so think about something special you might love to do – perhaps spend the day with the Queen at Balmoral or with your favourite Star (could be Pop Star, TV Star, Film Star or Sports Star) at their huge mansion, where you will be waited on by all the staff. What would need to happen for such a great time as that to take place? Have a look through these responses - 15 are negative or bad ways of responding to such an invitation and 15 are positive or good ways of responding. Then think about how they might apply to heaven.

Bad things/responses:

1. Get an invitation but you think it is a joke
2. Don’t bother replying to the invitation
3. Not be bothered if you have something else happening that day
4. When you discover it is real, and it is free, ask how much they are going to give you to turn up
5. Tell all of your friends about how important you are because the famous person contacted you

6. Don't bother to find out anything about your host, the famous person, before the big day
7. Come along in any old clothes as you are more comfortable in them – and you don't see why you should wear the smart ones as they look so uncomfortable
8. Moan about travelling in the limo – you say “I expected a private helicopter or jet”
9. Your host greets you personally, knows who you are and lets you in but you just walk past them and start telling other guests what a great person you are
10. Ignore your host because you are not the centre of attention
11. Moan to your host, and complain about not being able to invite all your friends. You say you thought it was just going to be about you as you are the most interesting person here today
12. It's all free, so you see how many free things can you stuff into your pockets, because after all this is all about what you want
13. You can't wait to get away from your host so you can talk to other people – they're much more interesting than your host
14. Other guests say it is a wonderful opportunity but for you it is so boring as they want to talk about their host, not about you
15. Hope you can leave early before the big event

Good things/responses:

1. Be invited
2. Accept the invitation
3. Be prepared so you make sure you keep the day free
4. Be super excited when you discover it is all for free
5. Tell your friends how excited you are about the big day
6. Make sure you know all about your host before the big day
7. Your host sends you smart clothes to wear so you will be recognised when you arrive
8. Travel in the huge limo that your host sends for you
9. You are surprised when your host greets you personally, is excited to meet you, and knows all about you
10. Be excited about meeting your host when you arrive

11. Be interested in your host when they meet you
12. Enjoy all the free fun
13. Be eager to spend as much time as possible with the host
14. Be thankful for the wonderful opportunity
15. You have so much fun during the big event and you wish it would last forever

Applying this to heaven:

1. God invites us but many people refuse to believe it is a free gift
2. We need to accept the invitation
3. We need to be prepared – because we don't know when we are going to die – we all assume it will be many years away
4. It is not about ME and what I am going to get out of it
5. The gospel is GOOD NEWS – so we should be eager to share it with people we know
6. Learn all you can about God because you are going to spend eternity with Him
7. The Bible says that when we “repent” – “turn around, from going MY way and decide to follow God's ways instead” - it is like taking off old clothes (your old self and the old ways you do things) and putting on new clothes (your new self and doing things God's way)
8. Our travel will be instantaneous – when we are asleep if there is no clock we have no idea how long we have been asleep. The Bible talks about Christians who die as “falling asleep”
9. When we get to heaven God will be excited to see us because we are His precious children, and He knows everything about us. How often do we ignore God and boast about how good a person we are, and how many wonderful things we have done
10. Are we excited about meeting God? How many people are not bothered about meeting God at all, and think heaven is a place for them to have fun with their family & friends.
11. S-I-N is all about ME being the centre of attention; in heaven it is God's mansion and His party – so He should be the centre of attention
12. Heaven is a free gift from God for all who accept the invitation. It is as simple as ABCD. A - We need to ADMIT we are self-centred and make a mess of things so need to “repent”. We need to BELIEVE that Jesus died and rose again to open the gates of heaven for us, so we can spend all eternity with God in heaven. We then need to COMMIT to following God's ways in our lives. We can only DO that if God the Holy Spirit is inside us giving us the power to want to follow God's ways and helping us get rid of the mess in our lives. Being baptised, getting confirmed is just the start of the journey. You have to CHOOSE to follow God way for the rest of your life rather than your way.
13. How many people talk about heaven as a place where they will see their family and friends and not about the place where God is? How rude is that!!
14. We do good things for God NOT to earn His love but because we are so thankful for the free gift He gives us when we choose to go HIS way instead of MY way

15. People think heaven will be boring. We have the whole UNIVERSE – billions of galaxies, with quadrillions of planets to explore as that is all God's creation. Appreciating all of God's creation as He shows us around will be absolutely amazing.

Hope you had fun with this quiz, and discussed these questions with other people – if you did you can now have another discussion with them now you know the answers. Such discussions grow your faith and if the other person is not a Christian then you are being “a missionary at home” – as this is “evangelism” – so well done. That is you following Jesus' command to you as a Christian – read the first part of Matthew 28:19 and then Matthew 28:20. And if you did not have discussions with people who are not Christians – then now is your chance as you a lot more information. Don't worry if they ask you a question you cannot answer, just say “that is a good question, I will talk to someone at church and then come back to you with an answer” – that means you get a chance for a further discussion about your faith. Remember verse 20 reminds you that someone is helping you so no need to be afraid.
